How do I find information about the Renaissance at the library?

Use the Catalog

catalog.ppld.org

Type in these example search words:

Renaissance and Europe and juvenile

(or use other keywords with renaissance: town, art, architecture, invention, explorers, Italy, England)

Michelangelo and juvenile

(or other famous names: Shakespeare, Leonardo da Vinci, Martin Luther, Elizabeth I, Ferdinand Magellan, Christopher Columbus, etc.)

What does Juvenile (J) mean?
